

For several thousand years, philosophers, lawyers, and theologians have developed a theory of the just war, where rules are set for deciding when a war should be fought and what tactics can be employed in war. During the entirety of that period chemical and biological weapons have been banned. In this public lecture, reasons are given for thinking that just war theory cannot support a complete ban on such weapons, unless a similar ban on the use of bombs is also endorsed.



Larry May is Professor of Philosophy at Washington University in St. Louis and Research Professor of Social Justice at the Centre for Applied Philosophy and Public Ethics. He has a BS in international affairs, MA and PhD degrees in philosophy, and a JD in law. He has published over 20 books, including three books on the normative foundations of international criminal law, all published by Cambridge University Press, which have recently won awards in both law and in philosophy.
