Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade & ANU College of Law The United Nations Convention on the Law of the Sea opened for signature on 10 December 1982 at Montego Bay, Jamaica. Thirty years on, the Convention has assumed the contours of universality—with 162 States Party. The achievements it embodies are immense. The drafters of the Convention strived to improve global security and justice among states, while recognising that the oceans and their finite resources. should be dealt with holistically. It is a framework for dealing with the myriad ways in which humanity interacts with the oceans. The Convention has created a robust but flexible framework for balancing intricate relationships, such as those of coastal states and seafaring

nations, developing and developed states, as well as for balancing protection and preservation of the marine environment with sustainable use of the resources of the oceans. But significant challenges remain. As an island state, straddling three great oceans—the Pacific, the Indian and the Southern—Australia has fundamental and abiding interests in the strengthening and progressive development of the Convention regime.

Join Professor Ivan Shearer, one of the world's leading scholars on the law of the sea, together with a range of eminent practitioners and academics, as they consider the achievements of the last 30 years and the challenges of the future.
