The Australian National University is consistently ranked internationally as amongst the world's top universities. The ANU College of Law, Australia's national law school, is ranked in the top 15 law schools in the world. Law researchers at ANU have achieved a top ranking of 5 in ERA 2010 and ERA 2012.

The College leads the way in the development of online legal education and is expanding its offerings in this fast-developing field. It is expected that applicants will have an affinity with online education.

The College seeks to make the following appointments:

Senior Lecturer, Level C (up to two positions): the College has particular teaching needs in the areas of Torts, Criminal Law & Procedure; Litigation & Dispute Management; and Evidence.

Associate Professor, Level D (one position): the College seeks to appoint an academic leader in its rapidly growing Law, Governance and Development specialisation. This area of research and teaching focuses on the role of law in developing and transitional countries. The program includes post-conflict state-building, strengthening the rule of law, integrity and anti-corruption, court systems and judicial training, constitutional reform, human rights, and land and property systems. It also encompasses international trade and investment law, and international financial institutions.
