The workshop will be the first in a series of events designed to broker networks and partnerships for research and innovation for health in the region.

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This collaborative event aims to invigorate a new health research community from Australia and the Pacific islands region in the context of the unfolding UN Sustainable Development agenda. The workshop will be the first in a series of events designed to broker networks and partnerships for research and innovation for health in the region.

Workshop organisers and sponsors have set out to organise an event that is deliberately different from standard conferences. An emphasis has been placed on seeking funding for travel scholarships to bring Pacific voices, scholars and practitioners to the event in order to construct research agendas that are Pacific-driven, respond to needs and create agendas for joint research and action.

The workshop's 4 thematic streams are wide ranging and reflect the diverse challenges and opportunities for health and policy in the region in the context of the unfolding SDG agenda. These concurrent sessions will be co-chaired by Australian and Pacific Island researchers and practitioners who will provide lead inputs to kick start a conversations designed to address key questions and issues around capacity and research needs in Pacific health under the SDG agenda. This will use a modified talanoa method with a facilitator engaging with delegates to contribute their experience to develop the conversation further.
